


Librarian's Book of the month

TIMELESS TALES: WHY GOOD WRITING IS EVERLASTING

Good storytelling is knowing that characters aren't one dimensional, that they don't always fit a stereotype, no one does and that is the essence of human nature. Good people can do bad things; to create a real, human character they must also be flawed just like all of us are, a reflection of humanity. Writing is also a form of communication, an author wants their words to be heard and understood, perhaps expressing something they could only ever write down, hoping to find others who share their experience and emotions. Writing is beautiful and also timeless; messages in Shakespeare are just as relevant as they were hundreds of years ago, because people have always been people, with real, human, flawed emotion and that is the human experience, this is why Shakespeare's writing is so good, so genius, because he captured the essence of real human life, and wrote for all making it universal and this is the reason why it has endured . As they are such strong emotions, such as Romeo and Juliet when they first fall in love, or Macbeth; tormented by guilt.

Another example is Little Women by Louisa May Alcott which also demonstrates how everyday family life still shares themes of love, loss and jealousy. There will always be love stories, always be tragedies, because they are such a big part of human life, and writing is a way of expressing those emotions.

Despite the advance of technology and the growing number of teenagers being addicted to screens, literature is as relevant as ever. In fact we need it, it builds compassion, empathy and a deeper understanding of the world around us, knowledge that cannot be obtained from a fact book, nor taught by a robot but a true human expression of thoughts. Good writing and literature has been around for thousands of years and I believe that it will never be irrelevant, and that we can't as a society, must not as a society, progress past the need for it, because then in a way we can become robots ourselves. Losing our own humanity. In fact we are losing the humanity in lots of pieces of writing already. Who would have thought that instead of admin or calculations, robots would be writing poetry books or scripts? There is no human element. It is not unusual in the highschool experience to see AI being used for schoolwork; I know people who have used AI to help write speeches, essays, me and my friend experimented by seeing if AI could write a script for the drama club we run, it lacked a human element, AI follows commands, the opposite of creativity, yet humans created it, so in some way it is based off human experiences so I guess that is a paradox in itself. More scarily some of these pieces of writing are starting to become convincing, compelling, which is almost unnatural. Perhaps it is not the words itself, but the meaning and emotion behind them, that is lost when it is created by an algorithm.

It isn't going back to using quill and parchment, it's just remembering despite the rapidly changing world around us, writing is a cornerstone in basic communication, and I feel that is being devalued; by AI, screens and

the masses of content already out there, though it is important to have a diverse selection of books, TV and stage shows, sometimes in all the content it is hard to pick out the ones worth seeing, or reading which is strange because especially theatre, in the past was for all, the rich and the poor would come

to watch Shakespeare plays, there was something in it for all and there was much less choice in what they were seeing, and everyone could connect with it on some basic level. I guess what I'm trying to say is that

good writing, whether it is theatre, a sitcom, or a novel should be universal, everyone should be able to connect with it.

It is also proven that people who read and write more have a larger vocabulary, and can therefore express themselves better, and are happier people, a lot of value is is placed on Science and Maths and for good reason, they are two important subjects, but less on poetry and theatre and writing which I think are all important in order to be a happier and well rounded person.

Education is power. And good writing provides that, not just factually but in the way humans learn from one another, valuable experiences are passed down. I think I've learned much more important lessons from novels than from a textbook. We should be encouraged to create and express ourselves through writing, and to read the words of others because it is so important to express your own emotions and to build an understanding of other peoples. In some ways we are more culture rich than ever, hundreds more TV channels, choices of books, fan fictions, stage shows. Though some are rapidly becoming modern classics, some are the same ideas churned up over and over again, more content doesn't necessarily mean more quality, instead one dimensional characters, tropes and sometimes offensive stereotypes pepper most, for example, disney plus shows, often having almost identical plot lines. In all the content is is hard to distinguish good script writing and literature from bad, and to find time to enjoy it when glued to a screen, but I think the need for especially young people to read, and enjoy good writing is as present as ever, as it broadens the mind and allows us to be more creative, and emphasise with others. Writing can connect people, as it represents something so quintessentially human, and that's why it is one of the foundations of our culture and why I believe it will last forever.

One person said:

Start studying early, make flashcards every day/week/ after a class so you don't have to worry about making flashcards before an exam.

Keely Hodgkinson won the women's 800m final after completing it in 1:56.72 with Tsige Dugma coming in second with 1:57.15, closely followed by Mary Moraa with 1:57.42. Hodgkinson took the lead 200m into the race exactly like she had planned, but Moraa was right behind her but Hodgkinson didn't let her trouble her, so instead she pressed on coming into the final bend and then she pressed on again coming out of it. She pulled away from everyone else in the final straight and ran across the line alone with a gap between her and Dugma who overtook Moraa who had fallen back and got bronze. "I was just so focused on getting to that line, and I knew I'd be strong in the last hundred." said Keely Hodgkinson.

In previous competitions, Hodgkinson won silver after silver and after she won gold in the 2024 Paris Olympics, she became the 3rd British woman to win the 800m sprint at the Olympics after Ann Packer and Kelly Holmes.


SIMONE BILES ACHIEVES 'MORE THAN HER WILDEST DREAMS' IN PARIS By Lacey Hilson

Simone Biles says she has achieved more than her wildest dreams despite the errors in two finals on Monday that cost her the chance to add more Olympic gold medals.

The 27 year old American who won team all round and vault gold twice landed with both feet outside the area to take silver hom. That came after shed fallen off the beam to finish fifth in the 'odd' final during which she was frustrated by shushing the crowd.

Three years after pulling out of several events in Tokyo and wondering if she would ever compete again, the world's most decorated gymnast now has 11 Olympic medals.

"I'm not upset about my performance, I'm actually happy, proud and even more excited that it's over, the stress of it," Biles told a packed news conference. "I've accomplished way more than my wildest dreams, not just at this Olympics but in the sport, so I can't be mad at my performances."I'm pretty proud of myself and it's always so exciting to compete."



REFUGEE BOXER CINDY NGAMBA STILL UNABLE TO GET BRITISH CITIZENSHIP

Despite Ngamba growing up in England, and referring to it as her home, she represented the Refugee Olympic Team in the Paris 2024 Olympics.

Refugee boxer Cindy Ngamba is unable to get British citizenship despite fleeing to the UK when she was 10 years old, and training in Sheffield. Even though she grew up in England, went to school there, and calls England her home.

She is heavily supported by British boxing, and trains with GB boxing, however is not allowed to compete for Great Britain. This year she became the first athlete to win a medal for the Refugee Olympic team; which is incredible, and says she is proud of her refugee status stating she "holds her refugee flag high so people around the world can see it and be proud to call themselves refugees." Whilst this is a great message, it seems unfair that she is unable to compete for Great Britain, despite having lived here for 15 years.

This is a clear indication of how hard it can be to get UK citizenship, Ngmaba has applied multiple times and has been repeatedly denied citizenship, even after GB boxing supported her application to the home office, Ngamba talks about her experience as a migrant, and living in constant fear she could be deported. "Even when I was walking down the street they could've put me in a van, when I woke up they could have been waiting at my door."

One day they did just that, they handcuffed Ngmaba, put her in a van and drove her to a nearby detention centre. "That was the worst" Ngamba says " Everything was numb, I couldn't talk, only see and hear ... I was so shocked." Luckily, her brother contacted an uncle in France and between them managed to get the paperwork the authorities needed, and Ngmaba was granted Refugee status in 2019. Ngamba also says that when she first got her refugee status, she was almost embarrassed. "I'm not gonna lie when I first got my refugee status I was a bit embarrassed you know, because people think I came to the country to take, take, take." This clearly shows that people's attitude towards refugees needs to change, especially as Ngamba could have given so much back to the country, by winning a medal for Britain.

Ngamba works very closely with team GB, McCracken referring to her as "part of the family." However, Ngmaba is still considered a refugee, and is unable to compete with the other British athletes, despite being an "honorary member" of the team.

The Refugee Olympic Team was first introduced in 2016, and is definitely great progress; the Guardian calling it "a team of hope" to bring more attention to refugees and the issues they can face, but there is still much more to be done, people's attitudes need to change.



GENDER TEST CONTROVERSY

The Algerian boxer Imane Khelif was banned and said to have failed a gender eligibility test, but has been allowed to compete in Paris despite it.

The Italian boxer quit the 66 kg category and ended her olympic dreams after being unable to carry on after a blow to the nose.

Italian boxer Angela Carini quit after 46 seconds in the ring with Khelif, she says "I have never felt a punch like this before."After her fight opponent failed a gender eligibility test.

After the fight Carini did not shake hands with Khelif and was seen with tears in her eyes.

Prior to the match, in 2023, Khelif was injured by a competitor who was banned from the world championships and was unable to carry on due to a heavy blow to the face. She said that she "preferred to stop for my health."

Before this the Alerian boxer was disqualified from the world championships in Delhi alongside Tiwan's Lin Yu-ting after the international boxing association (IBA) said a test found "both athletes did not meet the required eligibility criteria".



After Inmane Khelif was crowned Olympic champion she filed a lawsuit against J.K Rowling and Elon Musk, over " acts of cyberbullying and harassment ". J.K Rowling said after the match against the Italian woman Angela Carini " enjoying the distress of a woman he's just punched in the head". Following J.K's claim of the boxer being "male" and Elon Musk saying "men do not belong in women's sports."

Overall this is a very controversial story that people are not so open to talk about it.
